Presidents Message Tina Holmlund, SCHS President

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2020 was a difficult year but it proved how resilient we can be – together. I cannot adequately express how thankful I am for your support and understanding during these trying times. Some of the new protocols were frustrating but the Board, staff, adopters and community complied so we have been able to continue operating during Covid-19 safely. We closed the shelter to everyone except a few essential workers. Adoptions were done outside with staff and clients wearing masks. We miss having people in the shelter to walk dogs, socialize cats and tour the facility, but we must stay safe.

In spite of the obstacles presented by Covid-19 we have had more animal adoptions than any previous year (see adoption chart on page 2). It is apparent that as we socially distance, quarantine and wear masks, animals bring us comfort and joy. They do so much for us- we need to give back. We are not sure what 2021 will bring but we are ready to step up to any challenge, with you beside us, as we continue to improve the lives of Stone County's animals.

SCHS and the Pandemic

<u>The Corona Virus</u> caused us to do things a little differently this year. We encouraged everyone to get online to view our animals and fill out an adoption application for any animals they wanted to meet. Our adoption coordinator then contacted them to set an appointment. All adoptions took place outside with everyone wearing masks.

This system continues to work great as we head into 2021 and will continue for as long as necessary.

The total number of dogs surrendered to us in 2020 equaled the number we found homes for, which is 151. We also found good homes for 78 cats. Although the number of unwanted animals in the community saddens us, we love when it feels like a revolving door at the shelter because that means we are finding homes for all of these orphans.

Low Cost Spay/Neuter

Once a month, SCHS holds a Spay/Neuter Clinic at Nixon's Animal Hospital for low-income residents. This clinic is available to Stone County residents only.

Clients pay \$30 for their pet to be fixed and SCHS pays the remaining \$45. Appointments can be made by calling SCHS at (870) 269-5200.

Spay Arkansas

SCHS proudly partnered with Spay Arkansas to offer high quality and affordable spay/neuter services. These clinics are available to Stone and its surrounding 6 counties. The total animals altered in 2020 with Spay Arkansas was 546. Our July clinic was done "drive-by" style; the clients drove up, masks on, animals already in crates. Masked volunteers outside took the animals and handed them off to the masked vet techs and veterinarians inside. Very new and interesting experience for all involved.

The clients paid \$15 per cat and \$25 per dog. This low price also included rabies shots, annual shots, flea/tick meds if needed and Ehrlichia (the tick disease) tests for the dogs. The Ehrlichia positive dogs even got sent home with medication to treat their disease.









Did You Know...

Your dog can get **HEARTWORMS** from a tiny mosquito bite?!

The Best Treatment is Prevention!

Prevention is easy and less expensive than treating any issues those bugs create for your pets. Just give your pet medicine each month to keep those pesky bugs off of them.

P.S... Pets can get fleas from your best friend's dog that always comes over or your neighbor's pet that likes to visit your home. Fleas can come from the least expected source.

All of your animals (indoor AND outdoor) should be treated with flea/tick preventative.
